INTRODUCTION

Orange County Registrar of Voters is committed to educating each registered voter about their right to cast a ballot safely and securely. The Communications Tool Kit provides a variety of tools to help people and organizations who want to assist the Registrar of Voters with informing voters about how, when and where to cast a ballot for the 2026 General Election.

From social media posts, infographics, videos and more, this tool kit covers:

- Voting options – How to vote
- Voting locations – Where to vote
- Voting period – When to vote
- Safety – Creating a safe environment for election workers and voters
- Security – Protecting the election process and votes

We encourage you to share the information in this tool kit with your personal and professional networks and on your social media pages.

IMPORTANT TOPICS

The 2026 General Election has many important topics, but the following themes and messages are critical and repeated throughout this tool kit:

- Our voter education campaign tagline is “**Vote Easy. Vote Secure.**”
- **You Have Voting Options** – While Vote-By-Mail ballots are being delivered to all registered voters, there are four ways to vote.
- **You Have More Days to Vote** – Vote-By-Mail ballots can be cast starting 29 days before the traditional Election Day; Select Vote Centers are open for 11 days for in-person voting, and all Vote Centers are open for four days.
- **You Have Early In-Person Voting** – Select Vote Centers open Saturday, Oct. 24 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. for in-person voting.
- **Updating Your Voter Registration is Key** – We encourage people to register (if they haven’t) and to make sure the information they have on file is up to date and correct.
- **We Need Your Help** – Our community outreach team delivers trusted voter education presentations and resources to community groups and for special events. [To request a presentation or resources, call 714-567-7600 or visit ocvote.gov/community/speaker-requests.](#)

- Monday, Oct. 5: Vote-By-Mail Ballots begin to be delivered to U.S. Postal Service by this date
- Monday, Oct. 5: Early Voting Begins – Registrar of Voters office and all Ballot Drop Boxes open
- Monday, Oct. 19: Last day to register to vote
- Saturday, Oct. 24: **SELECT** Vote Centers open across the county / Vote in-person
- Saturday, Oct. 31: All Vote Centers open / Vote in-person
- Tuesday, Nov. 3: Voting ends at 8 p.m.

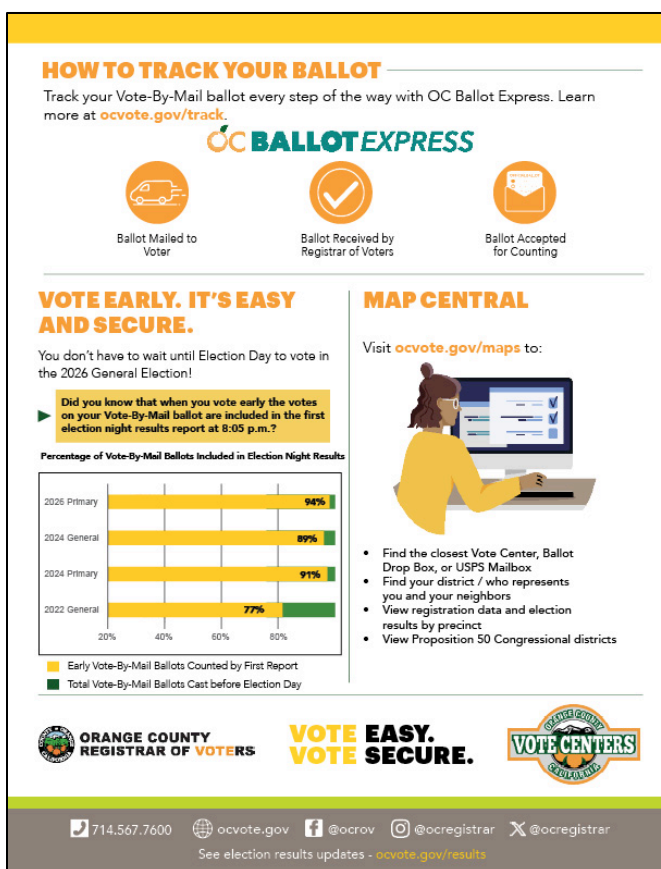
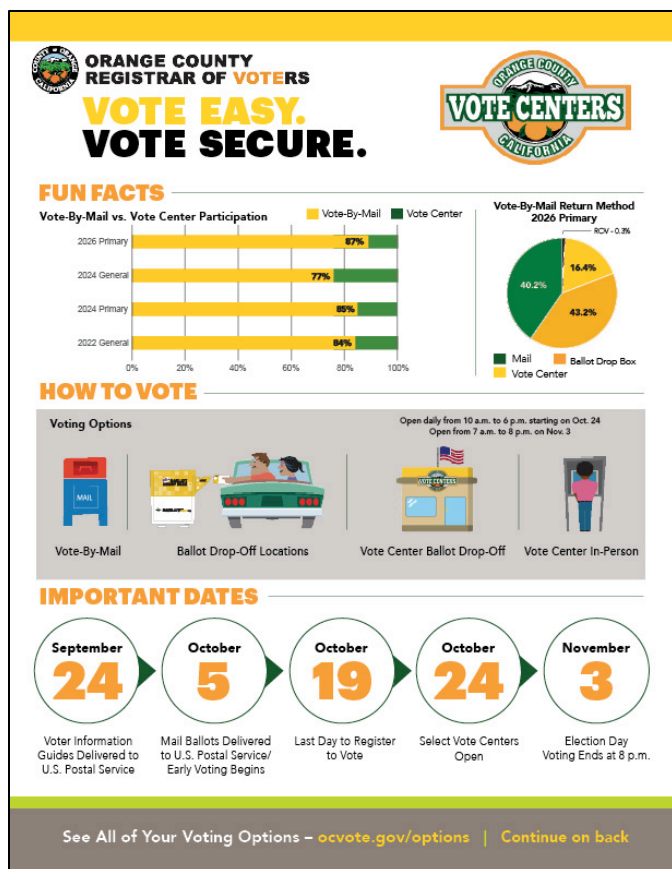

TOPIC: HOW TO VOTE (Continued)

Post 13: Oct. 5 – Nov. 3

Follow these helpful tips to ensure your mail-in ballot is counted when filling it out:

1. Use black ink.
2. Check your ballot for any damage, tears, or unclear marks.
3. Remember to sign the envelope before you mail your ballot or drop it off.
4. Mail ballots must be postmarked by Nov. 3, so submit your ballot on or before that date.

Post 14: Oct. 5 – Nov. 3

If you make a mistake on your ballot, you can simply draw a straight line through your mistake and clearly mark your new selection. No need to initial or sign your name after the correction. If needed, you can ask for a replacement ballot or visit a Vote Center for assistance.

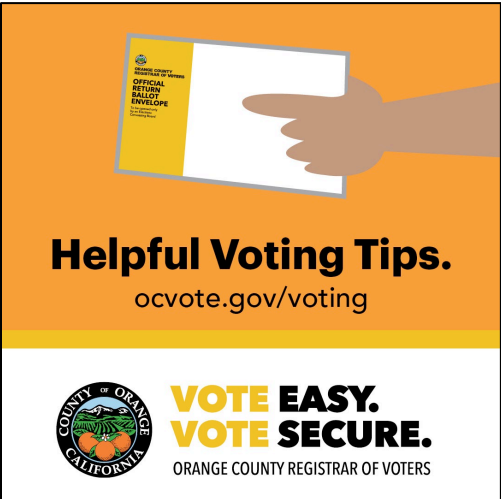

Post 16: Oct. 20 – Nov. 3

You don't have to wait until Election Day to vote in the 2026 General Election. Did you know that when you vote early and your signature is verified, the votes on your Vote-By-Mail ballot are included in the first election night results report posted at 8:05 p.m.?

About 90% of all early ballots are included in the first results report.

Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail ballots provide voters the option to access a Vote-By-Mail ballot on their computer. The electronic ballot can be downloaded to the voter's computer, marked using the voter's own assistive technology, then printed and returned as a paper Vote-By-Mail ballot.

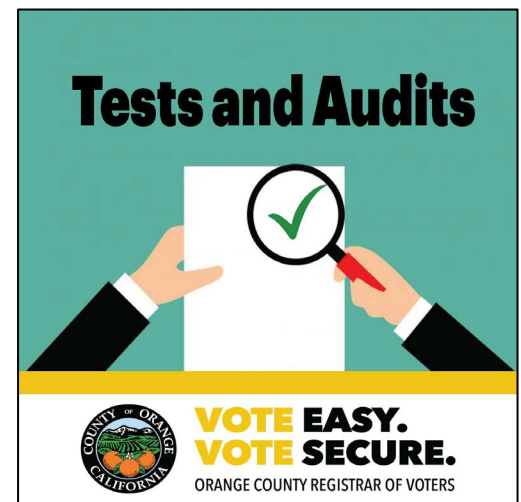

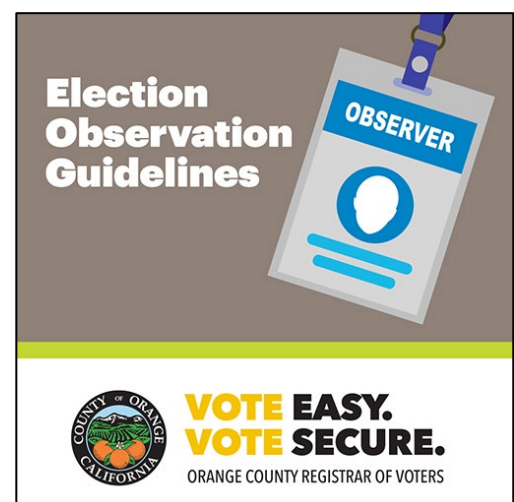

ARTICLE/EMAIL 1

How to Vote in Orange County in the 2026 General Election

Recommended timing for use: Sept. 1 – Nov. 3

For the 2026 General Election, Vote-By-Mail ballots will be delivered to the U.S. Postal Service no later than Oct. 5. Early voting begins and Ballot Drop Boxes will be unlocked on this day as well.

Registered voters in Orange County have several voting options they can use to cast their ballot for the General Election:

- Return your ballot by mail
- Drop it off at one of the countywide Ballot Drop Boxes
- Take it to an Orange County Vote Center
- Cast your ballot in person at a Vote Center

Select Vote Centers will open on Oct. 24, with additional Vote Centers opening on Oct. 31 for the last few days of voting, including Election Day. At a Vote Center, you can vote, update your registration, register to vote, get a replacement ballot, or receive general assistance.

ARTICLE/EMAIL 2

The Voter Registration Deadline is October 19

Recommended timing for use: Sept. 1 – Oct. 19

The voter registration deadline for the 2026 General Election is Monday, Oct. 19. [You can register to vote in Orange County today by visiting ocvote.gov/register.](#)

Vote-By-Mail ballots and envelopes are printed the first week of September. To have a ballot automatically mailed to your correct address, your registration must be current as of Sept. 4.

Replacement ballots are not automatically mailed when you change your address, so if you change your address after Sept. 4, you will need to request a replacement ballot to be mailed to you. [Check your registration status and make any updates now at ocvote.gov/verify.](#)

If you miss the registration deadline, you can still register to vote. Conditional voter registration extends the existing 15-day registration deadline in California to eligible voters, allowing them to register and vote 14 days prior to an election and on Election Day (Nov. 3, 2026). You can conditionally register online, in person at any Vote Center, or at Orange County Registrar of Voters, 1300 S. Grand Ave., Bldg. C, Santa Ana. If you register online and then go to a Vote Center, you will be able to cast a regular ballot.

Remember, when filling out and returning your ballot, “Vote Easy. Vote Secure.”

Vote Centers in Orange County Open on Oct. 24

Recommended timing for use: Sept. 1 – Nov. 3

Vote Centers are your one-stop shop for voting and registration needs for the 2026 General Election. There are 191 Vote Centers throughout Orange County where you can vote, update your registration, register to vote, get a replacement ballot or receive general assistance. Select Vote Centers open on Oct. 24, and all Vote Centers will be open on Oct. 31 through Nov. 3.

Did you know you can mark your ballot at home, bring it to any Vote Center, sign in, and scan it? You can also mark a newly printed ballot on site. [You can locate a Vote Center, view hours of operation, and see live wait times at ocvote.gov/time.](#)

You still have the option to vote by mail or use a secure Ballot Drop Box to cast your ballot. Vote-By-Mail ballots can be returned to the U.S. Post Office starting Oct. 5 and do not require postage. Your Vote-By-Mail ballot return envelope must be postmarked by Nov. 3. [You can locate a secure Ballot Drop Box near you by visiting ocvote.gov/dropbox.](#)

ARTICLE/EMAIL 5

Election Security in Orange County

Recommended timing for use: Sept. 1 – Nov. 3

Election security is a top priority for Orange County Registrar of Voters. More than 125 security measures used for the 2026 General Election include:

- Testing the accuracy of all ballot scanners before and after the election.
- Hand counting ballots from at least 1% of all precincts – randomly selected – to ensure the voting system tally is accurate.
- Confirming with the Secretary of State, before and after the election, that the certified voting system software has not been modified.

Additionally, all votes are cast on paper ballots, and the vote tally system is not connected to the internet. Orange County Registrar of Voters has partnerships with state and local law enforcement and the District Attorney's office.

Registered voters have four safe and secure options to return their ballots in Orange County. You can vote by mail or return your ballot to a Ballot Drop Box or a Vote Center. You can vote in-person at any of the Vote Centers, too. All four ways ensure that your ballot will be received by the Registrar of Voters.

ARTICLE/EMAIL 6

Resources for Voters with Disabilities and Overseas Voters

Recommended timing for use: Sept. 1 – Nov. 3

Orange County Registrar of Voters has resources available for voters with disabilities and overseas voters. For the 2026 General Election, the Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail ballot provides voters the option to request a Vote-By-Mail ballot to be delivered to them electronically. The electronic ballot can be downloaded to the voter's computer, marked using the voter's own assistive technology, and then printed and returned as a paper ballot. All Vote Centers in Orange County will also feature:

- Accessible ballot marking devices
- American Sign Language interpreter via video conferencing
- Curbside voting with a paper ballot
- Magnaviewers and Signature Guides
- Assistance from trained Vote Center staff upon request
- Voters may bring up to two individuals of their choosing to assist in casting their ballot
