Dear Orange County Voter:

Please note – this year voting is different! This Voter Information Guide contains information for the March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary Election. Please take a moment to review your options prior to voting:

- **Vote-by-Mail for All:** Starting with this election every voter will now receive a Vote-by-Mail ballot. If you choose to vote at home you can return your ballot by mail (no postage required), or at one of our secure ballot drop boxes. Find a drop box near you at **ocvote.com/dropbox.***
- **Vote Center Voting:** We are now operating nearly 200 full-service Vote Centers throughout Orange County. You can vote in-person at any location from February 22 – March 3, 2020. Find a Vote Center near you at **ocvote.com/votecenter**.
- **Election Day is Now 11 Days:** In-person voting begins February 22nd and is open through March 3, 2020. In order to avoid congestion do not wait until March 3rd to vote if possible! With so many options, including Saturdays and Sundays, there's no reason to wait until Election Day!

This new model of voting provides many more conveniences to improve the voter experience. Our Vote Centers provide full voting services, all while allowing you to vote at any location! Want to avoid voting in person? Use your Vote-by-Mail ballot and vote at home instead – see all of the options at **ocvote.com/votecenter**.

Can I vote if I register after the registration deadline?

Yes, conditional voter registration extends the 15-day registration deadline in California to eligible voters, allowing them to register and vote provisionally starting 14 days prior to an election and on Election Day, at the Registrar of Voters' office, located at 1300 S. Grand Ave., Bldg C, Santa Ana, 92705 or at any Vote Center.

Can I vote if I moved to another address in Orange County?

Yes, but you must register at your new address by the deadline above. You may vote and re-register at the:

- Registrar of Voters' office; or
- Any Vote Center

Can I vote if I have not voted in the last 4 years?

RESIDENCE CONFIRMATION:

If you have not voted in any election within the preceding four years, and your residence address, name, or party preference was not updated during that time, you need to confirm your residence address in order to remain on the active voter list and receive election materials in the mail.

Voting assistance available at Vote Centers

Every effort has been made to ensure all Vote Centers meet accessibility standards. Vote Centers will feature:

- Accessible voting machines to mark your ballot
- American Sign Language interpreter via video conferencing
- Curbside voting with paper ballot
- Additional assistance upon request

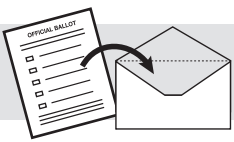
Voters that are unable to mark a ballot may bring up to two individuals to assist in voting (§ 14282 (b)).

Vote-by-Mail



You can vote by mail before Election Day

Beginning in 2020, every voter in Orange County will receive a Vote-by-Mail ballot. Then you can mark the ballot and send it back by mail or drop it off at any Vote Center or ballot drop box. Vote-by-Mail ballots must be postmarked or delivered to a Vote Center or ballot drop box by **March 3**.

Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail Ballot

The Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail ballot provides voters with disabilities and overseas voters the option to request a Vote-by-Mail ballot to be delivered electronically. The electronic ballot can be downloaded to the voter's computer, marked using the voter's own assistive technology and then printed. Follow the return instructions included with the electronic ballot.

To request your Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail ballot you can:

No later than seven days before Election Day, the voter may request the county elections official to send or deliver a ballot that voters with disabilities can read and mark privately and independently pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. Sec. 20901 et seq.).

How to return your Vote-by-Mail ballot

Mark your ballot, then follow the instructions on the official envelope to sign and seal your ballot in the postage-paid envelope provided.

You can:

- **Mail** your ballot, so that it is postmarked by Election Day, March 3
- **Hand-deliver** your ballot to the Orange County Registrar of Voters at:

- **Drop off** your ballot at any Vote Center in Orange County. Visit ocvote.com/votecenter for more information
- **Drop off** your ballot at any ballot drop box in Orange County. Visit ocvote.com/dropbox for more information

If you are unable to return your ballot, use your Vote-by-Mail envelope to authorize someone to return it for you.

State law requires that a Vote Center employee **must** make sure your envelope is filled out correctly.

How do primaries work in California?

In a Primary Election, voters choose candidates to run in the General Election in November.

For the March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary election, you will have Party-Nominated, Voter-Nominated and Nonpartisan contests on your ballot.



Presidential Party-Nominated Offices	California Top-Two Primary Voter-Nominated Offices	County or Local Offices Nonpartisan Offices
U.S. President Parties also nominate candidates for County Central Committees	U.S. Representative State Senator State Assembly Member	County Supervisor Judge of the Superior Court County Board of Education Member

In **Presidential (Party-Nominated) Offices**, only voters in the same political party can vote for these candidates.

In a **California Top-Two Primary**, for offices nominated by the voters, you can vote for any candidate, no matter what your party preference is.

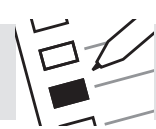
- **All voters** can vote in the Top-Two Primary.
- You can vote for **any candidate** or write in a candidate.
- A candidate’s **party preference** is shown with his/her name. If a candidate is not registered with a party, his/her party preference is listed as “None.”
- **The Top Two vote-getters** move on to the General Election in November. It is possible that the top two could be from the same party.

For **county or local offices** in a **Nonpartisan Primary**, all voters can vote for **any candidate**.

- The candidates’ party preference does not appear on the ballot.
- If a candidate receives 50% plus 1 vote in the Primary, that candidate is elected.
- If no candidate receives 50% plus 1 vote, the top two vote-getters go to a run-off at the November General Election, except for County Board of Education Member, where the top vote-getter is elected.

Why do we have a “Top-Two Primary”?

Proposition 14, passed by California voters on June 8, 2010, created the Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act. This act requires that the two candidates receiving the greatest number of votes in the Primary Election will appear on the General Election ballot regardless of party preference.



URGENT!

Not all voters can vote for President in the Presidential Primary.

Make sure to verify the party ballot you will receive:

- On the back cover of this pamphlet, or
- Online at ocvote.com/verify
- If you chose a political party when you registered to vote, you will get a ballot for that party.

Party preference

What used to be called “party affiliation” is now called “party preference” according to California law. If you did not choose a political party when you registered to vote, you are a **No Party Preference** voter, or **NPP** for short (previously known as “Decline-to-State”).

If you are a No Party Preference voter, you have 3 options:

• Nonpartisan

If you do not want to vote for any political parties, do nothing and you will receive a nonpartisan ballot, which will have:

- Candidates for voter-nominated and nonpartisan offices
- Ballot measures, if applicable

• Democratic

• American Independent

• Libertarian

If you want to vote for the above parties, you can select the party ballot at a Vote Center, or to vote by mail, request a ballot at ocvote.com/npp.

• Republican

• Green

• Peace and Freedom

If you want to vote for the above parties, you must re-register to vote with that party by Feb 18.

State law required language assistance information

Translated reference ballots in Tagalog and Farsi (Persian) for eligible precincts will be available at all Vote Centers in Orange County. You may also cast a Vote-by-Mail ballot in person at a Vote Center. For hours and locations, turn to section 8 of this guide, or visit ocvote.com/votecenter.

No later than seven days before the day of the election, the voter may request the county elections official to send a Vote-by-Mail ballot in Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese or Korean, or a translated reference ballot in Tagalog or Farsi (Persian) for eligible precincts.

Voters in eligible precincts may request a translated reference ballot through the postage-paid postcard on the back cover of this guide or:

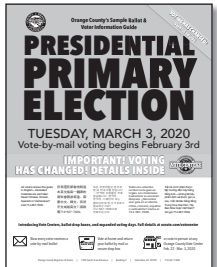

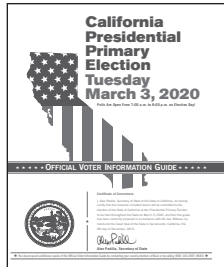

Full Text of Measure A County of Orange

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNTY OF ORANGE, CALIFORNIA,
AMENDING THE COUNTY CHARTER OF THE COUNTY OF ORANGE
TO REQUIRE A 2/3 VOTE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO
PROPOSE TAXES AND ADDING ARTICLE VII, SECTION 702 TO THE
CHARTER OF ORANGE COUNTY

The People of the County of Orange, California, ordain as follows:

SECTION 1: Article VII, Section 702, is added to the Charter of Orange County to read:

Sec. 702. Vote Requirement to Propose Taxes to Voters for Approval

No Board of Supervisors sponsored proposal to impose, extend or increase a tax shall be presented at an election unless the ordinance or resolution proposing to impose, extend or increase such tax is approved by at least a two-thirds vote of the total members of the Board of Supervisors. As used in this section, the term "tax" shall mean both a "general tax" and a "special tax" as defined in Article XIII C, Section 1, subdivisions (a) and (d), respectively, of the California Constitution. This section shall not apply to taxes proposed or levied pursuant to Government Code section 53311, *et seq.*

Impartial Analysis County of Orange Measure A

California law permits the voters to amend the County Charter if a majority of voters voting in an election approve the amendment. This measure, placed on the ballot by the Board of Supervisors for the County of Orange, would amend the Orange County Charter.

All taxes are defined as either general or special taxes with "general taxes" defined as taxes imposed for general governmental purposes, and "special taxes" defined as taxes imposed for specific purposes. Existing law requires majority voter approval for all general tax proposals imposed by any local government, and two-thirds voter approval for all special tax proposals.

State law provides that general taxes for the County of Orange cannot be presented at an election unless the ordinance or resolution proposing such tax was approved by a two-thirds vote of all members of the Board of Supervisors. A special tax, however, can be presented at an election by a simple majority vote of the Board of Supervisors, even though it must subsequently be approved by a two-thirds majority of County voters.

If approved, this measure would amend the County Charter to require any ordinance or resolution proposed by the Board of Supervisors, to impose, extend, or increase a tax, with the exception of taxes proposed or levied under the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 ("Mello-Roos Act"), be approved by at least a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Board of Supervisors for such tax to be presented to voters at an election.

This measure would establish the same two-third vote requirement for the Board of Supervisors to present a proposal to impose, extend or increase general or special taxes to voters. This measure does not change the voter approval requirements for such taxes once they have been placed on the ballot.

Future changes to the County Charter, including this measure if adopted, must be submitted to the voters for approval.

A "yes" vote is a vote to amend the Charter of the County of Orange to require any Board of Supervisors' proposal to impose, extend, or increase a tax, with the exception of a tax under the Mello-Roos Act, receive at least two-thirds approval of the Board of Supervisors before the tax is presented to the voters.

A "no" vote is a vote to not amend the Charter of the County of Orange.

Measure A**

Passage by Orange County voters of Measure A would add Section 702 to the Charter of the County of Orange. This amendment would require that any tax proposal by the Board of Supervisors be approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors to be presented to the voters for approval at an election. This amendment would apply to both general taxes and special taxes. General taxes are taxes imposed for general governmental purposes. Special taxes are taxes imposed for specific purposes.

General taxes proposed by the Board of Supervisors currently require a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors to be presented at an election. By requiring a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors to place special taxes on the ballot for voter approval, this measure would make it more difficult for the County of Orange to impose special taxes in the future. Special taxes provided for under Government Code §53311 et seq., are exempt from this Measure and can be proposed with a majority vote of the Board of Supervisors. The requirement that two-thirds of voters approve County special taxes is not affected by this Measure.

The fiscal impact of Measure A is unknown, as it would depend on future actions by the Board of Supervisors.



Argument in Favor of Measure A

Charter Amendment will hold elected officials to higher standard for raising taxes

You are overtaxed. With Measure A we can guarantee that special interests or a simple majority of politicians cannot put a tax vote to the public without overwhelming support from your elected county representatives. Your vote for Measure A closes a loophole in State law. If a special tax is to be imposed on taxpayers, there should be a public vote and a strong consensus on record from those you elect to serve your interests.

Under Article XIII of the current California State Constitution, two-thirds voter approval is required for general obligation bonds, parcel taxes, and non-value-based taxes on real property. These requirements were approved in 1986 by voters eager to protect themselves from increased local taxes. This amendment will ensure that this threshold applies to Board of Supervisors' votes as well.

According to CalTax, there were 228 local tax measures on the ballot statewide in 2016, over \$3 billion in tax increases. According to the California Local Government Finance Almanac, of 28 special tax measures on the ballot in June of 2018, 15 were approved. Since 2001, 60% of County majority-vote measures passed compared with 45% of two-thirds vote measures.

With this charter amendment, the Board of Supervisors adds taxpayer protections to County law. Today, it takes a two-thirds approval from voters to pass a special tax, but the Board can put a special tax on the ballot with a simple majority. Measure A closes that loophole.

Requiring a supermajority on the ballot makes sure that raising special taxes at the public's expense will be more challenging. This charter amendment will require a higher level of review before special taxes get on the county ballot. Orange County will be joining many cities in ensuring this constitutional protection in defending our already overburdened taxpayers.

Voter Bill of Rights



You have the following rights:

- 1. The right to vote if you are a registered voter.** You are eligible to vote if you are:
 - a U.S. citizen living in California
 - at least 18 years old
 - registered where you currently live
 - not currently in state or federal prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony
 - not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court
- 2. The right to vote if you are a registered voter even if your name is not on the list.** You will vote using a provisional ballot. Your vote will be counted if elections officials determine that you are eligible to vote.
- 3. The right to vote if you are still in line when the polls close.**
- 4. The right to cast a secret ballot** without anyone bothering you or telling you how to vote.
- 5. The right to get a new ballot if you have made a mistake,** if you have not already cast your ballot. You can:
 - **Ask an elections official at a Vote Center** for a new ballot,
 - **Exchange your vote-by-mail ballot** for a new one at an elections office, at a Vote Center, or
 - **Vote using a provisional ballot.**
- 6. The right to get help casting your ballot** from anyone you choose, except from your employer or union representative.
- 7. The right to drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at any polling place or Vote Center** in California.
- 8. The right to get election materials in a language other than English** if enough people in your voting precinct speak that language.
- 9. The right to ask questions to elections officials about election procedures** and watch the election process.

If the person you ask cannot answer your questions, they must send you to the right person for an answer. If you are disruptive, they can stop answering you.
- 10. The right to report any illegal or fraudulent election activity** to an elections official or the Secretary of State's office.
