Hi Jessica,

Thank you for taking my calls the past few days. As discussed yesterday morning, I wanted to provide you with the following information.

State law is clear. A voting system, in whole or in part, shall not be used unless it has been certified or conditionally approved by the Secretary of State prior to any election at which it is to be used (Elec. Code §§ 19202(a) and 19006(a)).

Additionally, pursuant to Elections Code section 19207.5, "[a]n elections official or the governing body of any jurisdiction that administers elections shall use a voting machine . . . that has been certified pursuant to this division, to do all of the following: (1) Provide sufficient numbers of voting machines or voting systems for accessibility pursuant to Section 19242 and the Help America Vote Act of 2002 (52 U.S.C. Sec. 20901 et seq.), and (2) Tabulate votes."

Moreover, Elections Code section 19003 states "Notwithstanding any other provision of the law to the contrary, including any city or county ordinance, unless that other provision of the law is deemed consistent with this division, this division shall govern voting systems." Section 19200 et seq. of the Elections Code governs the certification those voting systems. As such, if Newport Beach seeks to use a voting system, it must use an approved voting system vendor. GEMS, the voting system Newport Beach stated they will use for the upcoming November 3, 2026, election, is not an approved voting system by the State of California. The following voting system vendors are approved for use in California; Hart InterCivic, Liberty Vote USA, and Elections Systems & Software (ES&S). Subject: URGENT – Newport Beach November 3 Special Municipal Election – Signature Verification Access

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I am assisting the City Clerk of the City of Newport Beach with administration of three court-ordered municipal initiative measures to be submitted to Newport Beach voters on November 3, 2026.

The City is preparing to administer these measures separately from the election being conducted by the Orange County Registrar of Voters. The City has received the applicable voter registration file from Orange County; however, that file does not include voter signature images.

Because the City will be responsible for vote-by-mail ballot processing and signature verification under Elections Code section 3019 and the applicable Secretary of State regulations, we need to establish the legally authorized and operationally scalable mechanism for accessing the voter registration signatures necessary to perform those comparisons.

Orange County has advised that it will not provide the City with a file containing voter signature images. We understand that voter signatures are subject to specific confidentiality and access restrictions, and we are not asking for access outside of those requirements.

Could you please advise:

1. What mechanism is available to a city elections official independently conducting a municipal election to access the voter registration signatures necessary to perform VBM signature verification under Elections Code section 3019?
2. May a county elections official securely provide signature images or other electronic access to those signatures to the city elections official for this election-administration purpose?
3. If direct transmission of signature images is not permitted, what mechanism should the City use to perform signature verification electronically and at scale?
4. Is there a VoteCal or other state-authorized process available for this circumstance?

Timing is extremely critical. This is a court-ordered November 3, 2026 election that is being implemented on an extraordinarily compressed schedule. If possible, we would greatly appreciate speaking with the appropriate Elections Division or VoteCal staff member as soon as possible Monday morning.

I am available at any time and would be happy to provide additional information regarding the election or the City's planned signature-verification process.
