





INTRODUCTION

The Orange County Registrar of Voters is committed to protecting each registered voter's right to cast a ballot safely and securely. To help voters better understand how the State of California and Orange County are preparing for the March 5, 2024 Presidential Primary Election, this Communications Tool Kit provides a variety of tools to enable people and organizations to ensure local voters are well informed about how, when and where to cast a ballot. From social media posts, infographics, videos and more, this tool kit covers all the need-to-know information.

IMPORTANT TOPICS

There are many important topics to address as we ramp up for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election. Here is a list of the messages we have identified as critical for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election. You'll notice these themes throughout the materials provided in the tool kit below.

- Our voter education campaign tagline is "Vote Easy. Vote Secure." It is reflected in all of our communication materials.
- Presidential Primary Elections are Different
 - 1) Voting takes place in February and March (versus May and June during Gubernatorial Primary Elections)
 - 2) Candidates seeking the office of President of the United States appear on a voter's ballot based on the voter's political party preference
- You Have Voting Options While vote-by-mail ballots are being delivered to all registered voters, there are four ways to vote.
- Updating Your Voter Registration is Key We're encouraging people to register (if they haven't) and voters to make sure the information they have on file is up to date and correct!
- We Need the Community's Help The Registrar of Voters team is currently scheduling voter education presentations to community organizations, and we're encouraging people to contact us about presenting to their group!

IMPORTANT DATES

- Thursday, January 25: Voter Information Guides begin to be delivered to the U.S. Postal Service
- Monday, February 5: Vote-By-Mail Ballots begin to be delivered to U.S. Postal Service
- Monday, February 5: Early Voting Begins Registrar of Voters office and all Ballot Drop Boxes open
- Tuesday, February 20: Last day to register to vote
- Saturday, February 24: SELECT Vote Centers open across the county / Vote In-Person
- Saturday, March 2: All Vote Centers open / Vote In-Person
- Tuesday, March 5: Voting ends at 8 p.m.





To ensure your mail-in ballot is counted, here are some helpful tips when filling it out:

- 1. Use blue or black ink when filling out your ballot.
- 2. Check your ballot for any damage, tears, or unclear marks.
- 3. Remember to sign the envelope before you mail your ballot or drop it off.
- 4. Mail ballots must be postmarked by March 5, so submit your ballot on or before that date.



If you did not provide a party preference when you registered to vote, you are a No Party Preference Voter. When you receive your non-partisan ballot in the mail or at a Vote Center, it will not have the presidential contest listed. You can request a "crossover" party ballot or reregister to select a party preference to vote to nominate a presidential candidate for one of the parties. If you have questions about No Party Preference or crossover voting, visit ocvote.gov/NPP or call the Orange County ROV at 888-OCVOTES (888-628-6837) – they are available to help!



Article #1

How to Vote in Orange County in the 2024 Presidential Primary Election

Recommended timing for use: January 24-March 5

For the upcoming 2024 Presidential Primary Election, vote-by-mail ballots will be delivered to the U.S. Post Office on February 5.

Registered voters in Orange County have several voting options they can use to cast their ballot for the Presidential Primary Election. Voters can return their ballot by mail, or at one of the countywide ballot drop boxes, or an Orange County Vote Center. Voters can also cast a ballot in person at a Vote Center. Learn more about your voting options at ocvote.gov/voting.

About 40 Vote Centers open on February 24. About 140 more Vote Centers will open on March 2 for the last four days of voting, including Election Day. At a Vote Center, you can vote, update your registration, register to vote, get a replacement ballot, or receive general assistance. Find a Vote Center near you and view live wait times at ocvote.gov/voting/voting-and-dropoff-locations-by-election.

To find a ballot drop box near you, click ocvote.gov/voting/voting-and-dropoff-locations-by-election.

The deadline to register to vote for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election is February 20. Register to vote at ocvote.gov/registration.

Article #2

The Voter Registration Deadline is February 20

Recommended timing for use: January 24-February 20

If you want to check your registration status, or if you need to make updates, you can do so online at ocvote.gov/verify.

If you are unable to meet the voter registration deadline, you can still conditionally register to vote through March 5. Conditional voter registration extends the existing 15-day registration deadline in California to eligible voters, allowing them to register and vote provisionally 14 days prior to an election and on Election Day.

You can conditionally register in-person at a Vote Center or at the Registrar of Voters located at 1300 S. Grand Avenue, Bldg. C, Santa Ana, 92705. You may also conditionally register to vote online at <u>ocvote.gov/registration</u> but must then go to a Vote Center or the Registrar of Voters to be issued a provisional ballot.

Article #3

Vote Centers in Orange County Open on February 24

Recommended timing for use: February 5-March 5

Vote Centers are your one-stop shop for voting and registration needs for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election. There are more than 180 Vote Centers throughout Orange County where you can vote, update your registration, register to vote, get a replacement ballot or receive general assistance. Select Vote Centers open on February 24, and all Vote Centers will be open on March 2 through March 5. You can locate a Vote Center, view hours of operations, and see live wait times at documents-by-election.

You still have the option to vote by mail or use a secure ballot drop box to cast your ballot. Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned to the U.S. Post Office and do not require postage but must be postmarked by March 5. You can locate a secure ballot drop box near you at <a href="https://ocented.com/ocented-com/ocented

Article #4

No Party Preference / "Crossover" Voting for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election

Recommended timing for use: January 24-February 20

One of the key differences in the 2024 Presidential Primary Election concerns the ballot choices of No Party Preference voters. If you did not provide a party preference when you registered to vote, this means that you are a No Party Preference Voter. When you receive your non-partisan ballot in the mail or at a Vote Center, it will not have the names of the presidential candidates listed on it. The good news is that some parties allow you to "crossover" and request a ballot with the names of their presidential candidates on it. They are the American Independent Party, Democratic Party, and Libertarian Party.

The other qualified parties do not allow "No Party Preference" voters to vote their party's ballots. To receive a ballot for the Green Party, Peace and Freedom Party, or Republican Party, you must re-register to vote. Article #5

Important Dates for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election

Recommended timing for use: January 24-February 20

The Orange County Registrar of Voters created an Election Calendar to help you keep track of important deadlines for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election. You can access the calendar at ocvote.gov/calendar

- Thursday, January 25: Voter Information Guides begin to be delivered to the U.S. Postal Service
- Monday, February 5: Mail Ballots begin to be delivered to U.S. Postal Service
- Monday, February 5: Early Voting Begins Registrar of Voters Office and all Ballot Drop Boxes open for ballot drop-offs
- Tuesday, February 20: Last Day to register to vote
- Saturday, February 24: SELECT Vote Centers open across the county / Vote in-person
- Saturday, March 2: All Vote Centers Open / Vote in-person
- Tuesday, March 5: Voting ends at 8 p.m.

Article #6

Election Security in Orange County

Recommended timing for use: January 24-March 5

Election security is a top priority for the Orange County Registrar of Voters. Security measures for the 2024 Presidential Primary Election include:

- Test the accuracy of all ballot scanners before and after the election.
- Hand count ballots from at least 1% of all precincts randomly selected to ensure the voting system tally is accurate.
- Confirm with the Secretary of State before and after the election that the certified voting system software has not been modified.

Additionally, all votes are cast on paper ballots, and the vote tally system is not connected to the internet. The Orange County Registrar of Voters has partnerships with the Department of Homeland Security, State and local law enforcement, and the District Attorney's office.

Registered voters have four safe and secure options to return their ballots in Orange County. You can vote by mail or return your ballot to a ballot drop box or a Vote Center. You can vote in-person at any of the Vote Centers, too. All four ways ensure that your ballot will be received by the Registrar of Voters.

You can track your ballot through all steps of the process with OC Ballot Express. You also have the option to sign up for text and email updates. ocvote.gov/track/

Article #7

Resources for Voters with Disabilities and Overseas Voters

Recommended timing for use: January 24-March 5

The Orange County Registrar of Voters has resources available for voters with disabilities and overseas voters. For the 2024 Presidential Primary Election, the Remote Accessible Vote-By-Mail ballot provides voters the option to request a Vote-By-Mail ballot to be delivered to them electronically. The electronic ballot can be downloaded to the voter's computer, marked using the voter's own assistive technology, and then printed and returned as a paper ballot. ocvote.gov/ravbm/

Additionally, all Vote Centers in Orange County will feature:

- Accessible voting machines to mark your ballot
- American Sign Language interpreter via video conferencing
- Curbside voting with a paper ballot
- Additional assistance upon request
- Voters that are unable to mark a ballot may bring up to two individuals to assist in voting
